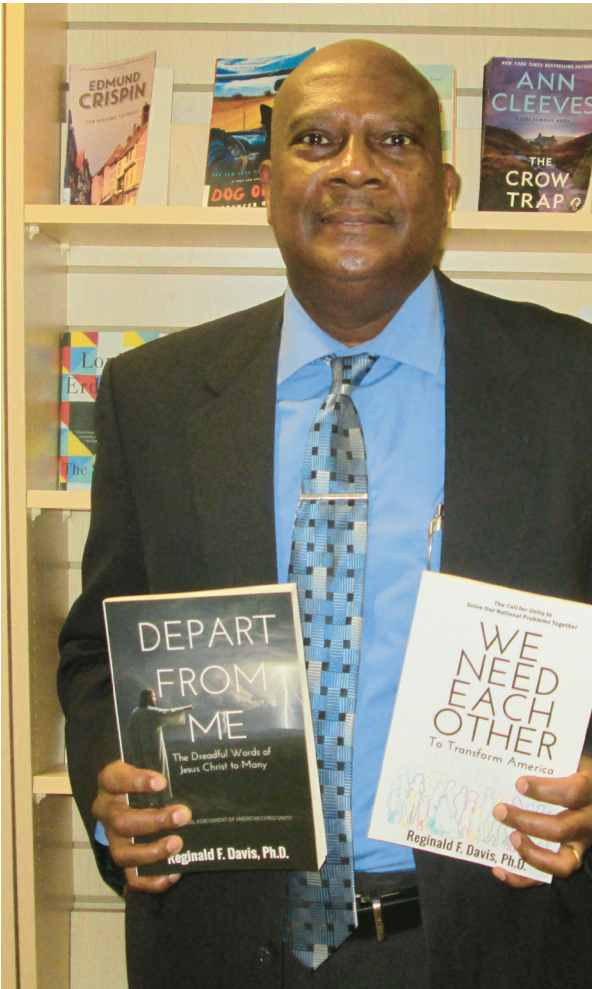
Men’s Charity Tennis
